What have we been learning this week?

Reception

This week in maths, Paddington and Elmer class have been learning about sorting, what it means, the different ways you can sort items and explaining their reasoning. The children have also had the opportunity to do sorting activities during their independent learning. In literacy the children have enjoyed the book Five Minutes Peace, a story about Mrs.Large (unsuccessfully) trying to find five minutes peace and quiet for herself, away from her three children. We have been talking about our families, what is special about families and what they enjoy doing together. Phonics this week has seen the children learning the sounds i, n, m, d and the tricky word 'no'.

The children have enjoyed having parent/carer visitors in the classroom this week. It has been lovely to share with you part of their school day and we hope you have found it informative and useful in seeing how the children learn.

Key Stage 1

Year 1

In English, we have been learning how to write a diary entry and have been learning about the features of a diary entry. In maths we are still counting from 1 to 20, and back again. Our focus this week has been on ordinal numbers (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc.) In our Geography lesson, we looked at different maps and their features and we located our school on our map. We also introduced directions using a compass. This week we also had our first computing lesson, where we talked about different types of technology and sorted different pictures into those that are examples of technology and those that are not. During our Art lesson, we have been mixing primary colours to make new colours.


Year 2

In maths we have moved onto Addition and Subtraction. The children have been recapping their number bonds to 10 and 20. The homework on MyMaths is linked to Place Value from last week and Addition and Subtraction. In English the children have been writing postcards in the past tense. They've explored lots of different places such as rainforests, space and the Antartica by using their imagination. In Global learning they have been discussing how people are similar and different around the world. They learnt about the Port of Spain in Trinidad and Tobago and next week will compare the geographical features to Reading.

Key Stage 2

Year3


In maths, we have added and subtracted in 1's, multiples of 100's, 3 digit and 1 digit numbers. In English, we re-worked the story of the "The Tin Forest'. We created a different character and setting using adjectives, planned and wrote our stories. In PSHE this week, we discussed and explored who the trusted adults are in our community that we can approach should we need help. In Science, we learnt about the effect that the sun has on our eyes and how we can protect them. We created an advertisement selling sunglasses and hats using the information we had learned. In Geography, we started with a P4C question regarding 'Should anyone own a river'. We then explored various global goals of clean water. In Art we used different techniques to mix colours emulating river water.



Year 4

What we did in Year 4 –We looked at the climate zones around the world in our global curriculum lessons. In Science we looked at the 3 states of matter – gas, liquid and solids and the arrangement of the particles of these forms of matter in their different states; describing how matter can change its' state when it is cooled or heated. The children were very engaged in this Science topic and lots of the children came up with interesting examples and questions relating to the topic. In Maths, we found 1000 more or less of a number (+1000, -1,000), practised counting in 25s. We also learnt the rules of Roman Numerals and used these to translate the numerals into numbers, giving the children a chance to show off some fantastic decoding skills. In English we continued to create pieces of writing based on Azzi in Between, such as descriptions and letters including specific grammar features, such as, time adverbials, prepositional phrases, colons and semicolons. In Whole Class Reading we continued reading 'The Abominables' and practising our VIPERS reading skills: vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation and retrieval using evidence from the text.





Year 5:

In English this week we had assessments for the first 3 days of our week. Miss Parry and Mrs Rapley would like to say how proud we are of all the children. We know it's been a hard week but we are proud of the resilience and knowledge the Year 5 have demonstrated. We have started to complete our poem from last week and we will be show casing the result next week. We are happy with the results so far.

In Maths, we have again been doing assessments, but we started the week off on our new topic of addition and subtraction. We began making one exchange then slowly moved on to making more than exchange using different place value columns.



Our Global Curriculum focus is Sustainable Development. This week we started to investigate different natural disasters and how they affect life and the people in that country. Our RE focus this term is Sikhism and we learnt about different celebrations and holidays. In Science we were investigating why the sun rises and sets at different times during the year. We were surprised to learn that not only does the Earth rotate on an axis of 23.5 degrees but also orbits the sun every 365.25 days. This gives rise to the seasons.



Year 6:

This week Year 6 have begun to explore narratives in their literacy lessons. They have explored what makes an effective narrative and how characters develop across a story. We used the example of how Harry Potter developed, calling on our knowledge of story structure. We then used our reading skills to establish what we knew about the characters, and what we could infer. Finally, we took turns in "Hot Seating" the characters to find out even more information.

In Maths, the children have been using the area model and long multiplication to solve some multi-step worded problems. The children have had pictorial representations (bar model) to support the abstract (number). This is where the children's knowledge of times tables is so important.

News items from this week

<u>COVID-19 reporting</u> – A reminder to all parents regarding COVID-19 reporting: Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms or a positive test result should stay at home and self-isolate immediately. If you have symptoms of COVID-19, you should arrange to have a PCR test as soon as possible. This still applies even if you have received one or more doses of COVID-19 vaccine.

The main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are:

- a high temperature this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If you have had close contact with someone who has tested positive you will usually be notified and advised to do so by NHS Test and Trace, including by the NHS COVID-19 app. If you believe that you are a contact of someone with COVID-19 but have not yet been notified by NHS Test and Trace, you should carefully follow the guidance on how to stay safe and prevent the spread of COVID-19. In this circumstance you can arrange to take a PCR test, even if you do not have symptoms, because you may be at higher risk of being infected.

If you are concerned that you may have symptoms of COVID-19, or you live with someone who has symptoms of COVID-19, follow the <u>Stay at Home:</u> guidance for households with possible or confirmed COVID-19.
