What have we been learning this week?

Reception

This week in maths, Paddington and Elmer class have been learning about comparison. We have been doing lots of practical activities and using the vocabulary of 'more' and 'less', along with explaining why. In literacy we have spent time looking at the book 'Home', which has pictures of many different types of homes. The children have been encouraged to describe the homes with an emphasis on using adjectives. There have been 'home' activities for the children to participate in during independent learning. The sounds we have learnt in phonics this week are g, o, c, k with the tricky word 'go'.



Key Stage 1

Year 1

In English, we have been learning how to create a poster and read a story called 'The Spacesuit'. In maths we are still counting from 1 to 20, and back again. Our focus this week has been working with part-whole models. In our Geography lesson, we looked at human features and physical features around our town. In Music this term, we have been learning about the beat and pulse of a piece of music. We have had such fun dancing and singing along. Science allowed us to explore magnetic and non-magnetic materials in our classroom. We discovered that the most common magnetic material is metal. During our Art lesson, we will were inspired by World Mental Health Day and created amazing Yellow artwork.

Year 2

We have been continuing with Addition and Subtraction in maths this week. The children learnt the number bonds to 100 and used the number bonds to 10 to help them. In English, year 2 have been learning about the Titanic and wrote diary entries as if they were a first- or third-class passenger. In DT, the children designed a tower that they would like to build next week. We had a great conversation during our Global Learning session about the importance of including others. We talked about how it would make people feel if they were excluded for their identity. We have also been comparing the geographical features of Reading and Port of Spain in Trinidad and Tobago.

If anyone is from Trinidad and Tobago and can share information about the culture there, please let us know as this is what we will be learning next week.

Key Stage 2

Year 3

We had an exciting week in Year 3 as we went on our first trip of the year! As our geography topic is rivers and clean water, we went for a walk to the River Thames! We were so lucky to have the river close by to visit. During the trip, we looked for different features of the river and looked to see whether there was much pollution and rubbish in the river. When we got back to school, we wrote about our trip. Thank you so much for the parents who supported our trip! In maths this week, we have been adding and subtracting using column method. In English, we began looking at a new text called "The Robot and the Bluebird". We learnt about how to use conjunctions. In RE, this week, we learnt about Diwali and how it is celebrated. We then created our own Diwali lamps! In Science, we learnt about shadows and wrote funny stories about a person who had lost their shadow!





Year 4:

We continued to look at the climate zones around the world in our global curriculum lessons. We then shifted our focus to Science where we looked at the 3 states of matter – gas, liquid and solids and the arrangement of the particles of these forms of matter in their different states; describing how matter can change its' state when it is cooled or heated. We melted chocolate at different temperatures to see how long it took to melt – unfortunately we did not get to eat any! The children were very engaged in this Science topic and lots of the children came up with interesting examples and questions relating to why certain things burn at different temperatures and the effects it can have on the objects! In Maths, we continued to find 1000 more or less of a number (+1000, -1,000), practised our 4 times table .We completed a fun and creative end of topic page in maths! In English we continued to create pieces of writing based on Azzi in Between, such as descriptions and letters including specific grammar features, such as, time adverbials, prepositional phrases and more. We wrote a spooky story based on a picture of a house stranded in the middle of the floor! In Whole Class Reading we continued reading 'The Abominables' and practising our VIPERS reading skills: vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation and retrieval using evidence from the text. A super week year 4!



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
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Year 5:

In English this week we have started planning for our Newspaper report on "Running Wild" - we are trying to recall how to write a newspaper from our lessons in Year 4. We focused on what makes a good newspaper and the "5Ws". In Maths, we have moved on slightly from addition and started to focus on subtraction. We subtracted numbers as far as the hundred thousand columns.

We also produce some "Jackson Pollock" type art this week where we represented our feelings towards natural disasters with different coloured paints. This represented our feeling in colour.






Our Global Curriculum focus is Sustainable Development. This week we started to investigate different natural disasters and how they affect life and the people in that country. Our RE focus this term is Sikhism and we learnt about different celebrations and holidays. In Science we started to investigation other planets rotation of the Sun and how this is different to Earth Years.

We have also started our Poetry with the writing competition. We are writing a poem all about us and sending it off to be published in a book!

Year 6

This week Year 6 have continued to develop their understanding of narratives and have begun to write their own. They have focused on the use of dialogue to move the action forward as well as learning how to use a colon in a detail:description sentence! Something myself and Miss Frain have been particularly impressed with.



In Science the children have continued to understand how we classify living things and have begun to apply the skills and knowledge they have learnt to plants! They grouped these into two broad groups, Vascular and non-vascular and then began to create subgroups based on what they had noticed using scientific enquiry.

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Next week some of the children will be away on residential, whilst others will be participating in an enrichment week ensuring that all our children receive an experience which helps develop them as a person and be their best version. We will keep you posted with pictures next week.



News items from this week

WORLD MENTAL HEALTH

Just like thousands of other schools, on Friday, 15th October 2021, Civitas Academy will be participating in World Mental Health Day. We will be supporting YoungMinds by saying "Hello Yellow!" and turning Civitas Academy yellow. We are asking for children to come to school wearing their own yellow clothes. On this day we are asking if you are able for a small donation to help support young minds, donations to be paid via Tucasi. This contribution will be used to support the work YoungMinds do, fighting for a future where all young minds are supported and empowered, whatever the challenges. Dig out your yellow socks, custard scarf, banana hats and Pikachu costumes – Together Civitas can show young people they're not alone with their mental health!



Uniform/clothing - now that the weather is getting colder, please remember to bring/wear appropriate clothing to school.

We would also like to remind parents/carers to label their child's uniform. We currently have just under 350 pupils in school, which is a lot of black jumpers, so to ensure it is returned to you, please make sure they are labelled.

Jewellery – children are only permitted to wear small studs in their ears. For PE they must be able to remove their earrings themselves, plasters cannot be worn.

<u>Parking</u> – a reminder to parents/carers to be mindful when parking on Great Knollys Street. The parking bays opposite the school entrance are residence parking only, please respect that residence will need to park here during school drop off and pick up.

<u>COVID-19 reporting</u> – A reminder to all parents regarding COVID-19 reporting: Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms or a positive test result should stay at home and self-isolate immediately. If you have symptoms of COVID-19, you should arrange to have a PCR test as soon as possible. This still applies even if you have received one or more doses of COVID-19 vaccine.

The main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are:

- a high temperature this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If you have had close contact with someone who has tested positive you will usually be notified and advised to do so by NHS Test and Trace, including by the NHS COVID-19 app. If you believe that you are a contact of someone with COVID-19 but have not yet been notified by NHS Test and Trace, you should carefully follow the guidance on how to stay safe and prevent the spread of COVID-19. In this circumstance you can arrange to take a PCR test, even if you do not have symptoms, because you may be at higher risk of being infected.

If you are concerned that you may have symptoms of COVID-19, or you live with someone who has symptoms of COVID-19, follow the <u>Stay at Home:</u> guidance for households with possible or confirmed COVID-19.
