Dear Parents and Carers,

Anti-Bullying Week 2022 takes place from Monday 14th – Friday 18th November with the theme 'Reach Out'; we will be kicking off the week by encouraging staff and children to wear odd socks on Monday.



Bullying affects millions of lives and can leave us feeling hopeless. But it doesn't have to be this way. We are encouraging our children to challenge it so that they can change it. And it starts by reaching out. Whether it's in school, at home, in the community or online, let's urge our children to reach out and show each other the support they need. Reach out to someone they trust if they need to talk. Reach out to someone they know is being bullied. Reach out and consider a new approach. And it doesn't stop with our young people. From teachers to parents and influencers to politicians, we all have a responsibility to help each other reach out. Together, let's be the change we want to see. Let's reflect on our own behaviour, set positive examples and create kinder communities. It takes courage, but it can change lives. Keeping safe and being respectful – With over 400 of our children attending our school now, the end of the day can become very busy when families are collecting their children. All procedures that are in place are there to keep everyone as safe as possible. We have continued with the separate line ups outside the gates for Reception and KS1 families who collect at 3.15pm and for KS2 families who collect at 3.25pm. The coned one-way system is still in place in the playground and children must stay with their families once they have been collected especially if they are waiting for older siblings; the waiting area is in the middle of the playground. When leaving school, please be mindful that you are crossing Hodsoll Road, please cross over onto the pavement, do not walk on the road and remind your children to do the same. There may be times when we ask you to wait if a car drives along the road, please be patient and always speak with respect to staff members aiming to keep our children and yourselves safe. We are a school at the heart of our community, please be considerate when parking as we want to ensure we have the support of our local residents, always.

The main Remembrance Sunday Service in Reading will be taking place at Reading Minster at 9.25am on 13 November and is open to all. What have we been learning this week?

Reception

Our global learning theme at the moment is 'Our Community and World Cultures' and at the moment we are focussing on 'The World'. In Literacy this week we have been reading the book 'Hello World' by Manya Stojic. This book is about greetings in different languages around the globe. In Reception, we have been looking at all the ways we know to greet each other in all our different languages. It was amazing to see how our children taught each other in the languages they are familiar with! We then looked at greetings in languages that were new to us and have also been singing a greeting song. We have looked at the world map to find different countries in the world. The children have been thinking and writing about what they want to be when they grow up. In Maths, we have been looking at the composition of the numbers one, two and three. We started Maths carousel activities this week, in which we have been making number three in different ways. In Art, he children have been using junk modelling to create a 'person'. The have also been drawing people in different occupations.

Key Stage 1

Year 1: In English this week, we have had a big focus on nouns and adjectives within our new text, 'Little Red Riding Hood'. We also looked at full stops and when to use capital letters in our writing. In Maths, we identified 2-D shapes. We spoke about their properties and discussed the different ways that we could sort them. In History, we learned how to describe a toy from 'today'. Over the next few weeks, we will be exploring toys from the past. It would be great for your child to have a discussion with a parent or grandparent about 'toys from the past'. In computing, we used the 'paintz app' on our laptops. We worked on using shapes and filling our shapes with colour. Our PSHE lesson was an opportunity for much discussion as we spoke about the differences between us and our classmates.

Year 2: What a great crazy hair day we had! Well Done Year 2 and parents for the amazing effort and donations!

This week Year 2 have continued to learn about Malala and her journey throughout her school life. We have begun to think about the features that we will need to write a narrative about Malala's life. We have explored different ways we can make our writing more interesting by using adjectives, similes and synonyms! Viaan said "Instead of using the word nice you can use the word delicious!" This was a great example of using an adjective and a synonym.

During PSHE we have been looking at similarities and differences. We now understand that it is okay for a boy to like the colour pink and for a girl to wear trousers to school. In year 2 we celebrate our differences! Alexa was able to share that she had blonde hair and Aizah had brown.

During music we are beginning to learn our KS1 performance songs, the lyrics have now been sent home. The songs can be found on YouTube. Please practice these at home. Some children will be given speaking parts, please practice these every day and memorize the words off by heart.



Key Stage 2

Year 3: This week in English the children have been exploring the key features of a recount. They have created keys, mind maps and planned to use these features ready to write their own recounts. In maths the children have been learning about multiplying and dividing by 3 and 4. They have used arrays and grouping to help them share into equal groups. In science this week the children enjoyed exploring and identifying different skeleton types. They looked at the differences between vertebrates and invertebrates and which animals are likely to have which skeleton types. They explored endoskeletons and exoskeletons and organized animals into groups based on this. In DT the children created their own pop-up cards after learning about Matthew Reinhardt, a children's book author, illustrator, and paper enginer. There were some great creations made by all the children.



Year 4: This week in English the children have been exploring the skills needed to write a diary entry. They learnt about adverbs for frequency, time conjunctions and first person perspective. In maths the children have been finishing their unit on area by comparing area and completing problems. In science this week the children enjoyed exploring the functions of different parts of the digestive system. They recapped the names of parts and looked at how these work to digest our food. In RE, the children continued our learning about the Nativity story and created story maps to retell the nativity. In PSHE, the children focused on understanding influences and how we respond to them. In history, the children learnt about Julius Caesar and Marc Antony.

Year 5: A great learning week in year 5! In English this week we have focused on the skills we will be using when we write out narratives next week. This included using the acronym DAD (dialogue, action, description) for including speech in our narratives and using expanded noun phrases for extra description. In Maths this week we have been multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000 as well as exploring square and cube numbers. In Global Learning we have been discovering more about the kingdom of Benin by developing an understanding of when in history the kingdom thrived and the creation story its inhabitants believed in.

Year 6: What an exciting week it has been! Year 6 started the week exploring several WW2 artefacts (including an evacuee's suitcase) that we borrowed from Reading Museum. This was to support their narrative writing in English, where the children will be writing about Willie's (a main character from our class novel Goodnight Mr Tom) experience of school. In maths we have been learning how to find equivalent fractions by multiplying and dividing (simplifying) and we have been learning ways of how to compare fractions. In Geography we have been learning about the Cogno Basin and the current deforestation that has been taking place. Over the coming weeks the children will continue to learn more about the geography of the Congo and recent conflicts that have been taking place as part of our global learning theme 'peace and conflict'.
