What have we been learning this week?

Reception

This week in Maths, we made comparisons between the weight of objects using their hands and estimated which is heavier or lighter. We have used balance scales to check our estimates. We looked at different objects and looked at which was heavier than, heaviest, light, lighter than and which was the l lightest. We identified that bigger items are not necessarily heavier. As our Global Learning Theme at the moment is 'Overcoming Prejudice', we read the story 'The Three Little Wolves and the Big Pad Pig'. We compared the story with The Three Little Pigs and the Big Bad Wolf. We put pictures on top of last week's story map, to be able to compare the two stories. What is the difference about the two stories? And what is the same?

In our Art area we made wolf faces and drew flower houses. In our writing area we created our own story maps and we wrote 'wanted' posters. The children have been cutting out wolves and pigs, trying to hold their scissors correctly. It was lovely to see so many children acting out the different characters in the role play area!

Key Stage 1

Year 1: We have had such a busy week in Year 1. In Maths we have explored the number line to 20 and looked at 1 more and 1 less. In English, we continued to work on Little Red Reading Hood. We now understand that a narrative needs a beginning, middle and end. We are working towards writing our own narrative based on the story of Little Red Reading Hood. In Geography we learned about a weather forecast and why we need one. In Science, we are investigating the properties of materials.


Year 2: This week in maths, the children have continued with money. They have looked at comparing total amounts of money. In English, the children have been starting to plan their narrative based on the story Hermelin. The children have been planning their detective and the crime that they are going to solve. In geography we looked at London landmarks and the children got to draw their own versions of the landmarks. In science we have looked at materials and looked at what materials we can see from the playground and the classroom.

Key Stage 2

Year 3: This week in maths, the children have continued with multiplication and division. They have looked at ways to flexibly partition numbers in order to divide them equally. They have started to explore vocabulary such as twice as much, three times as much and have been practicing doubling 2- digit numbers. In English the children have been exploring more features that we need to make our writing great! They have looked at inverted commas, past tense and time conjunctions this week. They have converted normal text into speech with their partners and created their own sentences featuring inverted commas to show the dialogue. In science this week the children started to look at different types of fossils and how they are made. They explored the fossilization process then sequenced pictures and text to show its order. In art the children designed, planned and created their own snail sculptures. They used clay to create exploring rolling and joining techniques. Next week both classes are looking forward to painting their sculptures. We are collecting empty, clean one liter yogurt containers or plastic plant containers of a similar size (approximately 10-15cm. We will use this for our following art lesson, so if you have any at home, please send them to school.









Year 4: Year 4 have had a very busy week. We have deepened our understanding of volcanoes and how they erupt and the impact it can have on the surrounding areas. We have been able to link this learning to our English lessons, where the children wrote their own narrative based on our class book, 'Escape from Pompeii'. Everyone wrote a fantastic narrative that included speech and created suspense throughout! During our maths lessons, we have been exploring multiplication and division and how we multiply using arrays but also using long multiplication and division! In Science, we learned about

amphibians and turned our focus to birds and started to group different types of birds into their correct classifications. We have also started our new whole class reading book – James and the Giant Peach – which has been super exciting to start unpicking key vocabulary and events.

Year 5: This week in English we have been further exploring Greek Myths and began to plan our own narratives using the techniques we found in our WAGOLL last week. In Maths we have been exploring the short division method through our understanding of place value. In Global Learning we have expanded our knowledge of grid references by learning how to read six-figure grid references on maps of the UK and Greece. In art we have been exploring Grecian sculptures and sculptures found in Reading. We compared the materials and techniques used in all the sculptures we investigated. Some of us have been out and about in our local community earning how to ride our bikes safely.

Year 6: In maths this week year 6 have started their new topic on ratio. We began by looking at the relationship between numbers and the children were introduced to the ratio symbol. In guided reading, we have continued reading our text The Wolves of Willoughby Chase. The children have enjoyed getting to know the main characters which has helped their writing in English where we learnt how to use dialogue to convey character and advance action. In D.T we have continued designing our padded seats. We discussed which materials to use and finalised our pattern designs and logos.
