What have we been learning this week?

Reception

This week in maths, Paddington and Elmer class have been consolidating learning about 'First, then and now.' They have been enjoying practical games adding more, to support their understanding. In Literacy, we have been reading 'The Wolf's Story' by Toby Forward and Izhar Cohen. The Wolf's Story is a story of Little Red Riding Hood from the perspective of the wolf. In this story, the wolf is able to share his side of the story explaining all of the events that happened, but in a way that depicts himself as a good, helpful wolf. In art, the children have looked closely at the 'big' eyes of the wolf. They used different shades of charcoal to draw an eye of the wolf. The children also explored the natural world by looking at, and talking about flowers, the trees in the playground and some different kind of herbs. After, they chose one of these to make an observational drawing. We also played different Phonics games, like read CVC words by playing a board game, and read CVC words by jumping the hoops outside.



Key Stage 1

Year 1: In English this week, the children have enjoyed reading our new class text 'The Beeman'. We made predictions about the text, read the story and shared our favourite parts of the story. The children then read a food advert for 'honey muffins', which was inspired by the story. We identified key features of adverts, including catchy titles and adjectives, and we created a text map for the advert. In maths, we have started our new 'fractions' topic. Our focus this week was all about finding a half. We have learnt how to half shapes and quantities. In Geography we continued our topic of our local area. The children discussed and wrote their likes and dislikes about Reading town.

Year 2: This week Year 2 have had a busy week! They have now begun their SATs papers! We are so pleased with how well the children coped and how resilient they all are! We started our SATs days with some delicious food so that the children were ready to learn and spoke about the importance of breakfast.

This week in English we started a new core text called "The Last Tree". The book is about a little weak tree, who is not good enough to be used for wood, but soon becomes the only tree left! In the end the last tree becomes the first strong tree of the forest! This book has given us lots of discussion points across our curriculum and it fits in beautifully with our global learning theme, sustainable development. The children are writing poems about the book and learning all the key features of poems as well as learning new vocabulary, like the word stanza. In maths we are continuing to consolidate our learning. The children have enjoyed lots of practical lessons like going on a shape hunt, exploring time through shadows and playing lots of fun maths games! This helps to put maths into context and problem solve.

Thank you for coming into school promptly this week, it is important that every child is on time so they can be ready to learn. Please continue to arrive at 8:40am next week so the children can continue to enjoy breakfast before the day starts.

Year 3: In Maths this week we have learnt how to find equivalent fractions. We have used a variety of pictorial resources to support our learning and understanding. In English we have found features of a newspaper report. We have been learning about Kid President which will lead up to next week's final write up of a newspaper report telling the world who Kid president is. In art our Kimmy Cantrell inspired masks have started to really take shape and are already looking amazing after the children spent this week using different materials to decorate them. We can't wait to see the finished product next week! In Spanish we have continued to learn the names of various animals as well as the feminine and masculine words. In Science we had such fun seeing how a magnet can counteract the force of gravity by doing an experiment using paper clips, thread, blocks or books to make a tower, sellotape and wand magnets.

Year 4:

In maths this week, we have finished our maths topic of money. We learnt how to add and subtract money. In English, we have learnt about the features of instruction writing and investigated how each feature is used. We have continued reading our text, The Explorer in whole class reading and practicing our VIPERS skills. Our afternoons have been a little different in each class this week as Richards class have been building their electronic board games that we designed last week. Murphy class are excited to create their board games next week. In the afternoons, Murphy class have focussed on science, PSHE and designing their board games.

Year 5:

In Year 5 this week we had a great surprise from the Reading Fire Service who came to speak to us about fire safety and fire evacuation. We saw their vehicles and they sprayed us with their water hoses – it was a good job that it was a warn day! Not only was it great fun but we also took part in a lot of discussions.








In English this week, we have started writing our instructions on how to make a Victorian Prison device that Victorian prisoners could use in their sentence to make it even more terrible. We have started to look at features in our writing and what a good instructional text looks like. In Maths this week we have finished our decimals module and the children had an opportunity to teach their peers.

In global learning we are continuing to investigate how the children were treated in the Victorian times and how this is different today. We have also completed a task where we looked at how law and punishment have evolved through time and what is acceptable now.

We look forward to sharing with you pictures of all our students in their traditional dress for cultural diversity day. Additionally, we look forward to speaking to the students about why it is important to understand other people's cultures and why we should keep and express our own culture.

Year 6:



After an incredibly intense SATs week, the children are back to their normal schedule and routine! This week in literacy, the children have responded to a letter from Mrs Ducker regarding her proposal to reduce break-times for Upper Key Stage 2. To say there was uproar is an understatement. The children have discussed counter arguments and created a formal persuasive letter which they will be publishing and sending to Mrs Ducker next week.



We have also taken some time to focus on the upcoming event, the Queens Jubilee whilst also celebrating cultural diversity day. It was fantastic to see so many of the children in their traditional attire. They also spent time researching their own heritage and then sharing this information with their peers.
