



EYFS Curriculum

What are the Areas of Learning?

The EYFS curriculum is made up of seven areas of learning. The three prime areas are fundamental throughout the EYFS and support all other learning. The four specific areas grow out of the prime areas, and teach children skills and knowledge.

What are the characteristics effective of Learning ?

The characteristics of effective learning are ways in which the child engages with people and their environment. They include Playing and Exploring, Active Learning and Creating and Thinking Critically. Having a knowledge of how children learn can help us support their development across all areas of the curriculum.

What is GLD?

By the end reception a child is considered to have a 'good level of development' if they have achieved at least the expected level in the Early Learning Goals in all aspects of PSED, Physical development, Communication and language, Literacy and Mathematics.

Phonics

What is Phonics?

Phonics is a method of teaching children how spoken words are composed of sounds called phonemes. The process of reading involves decoding or 'breaking' words into separate phonemes. For example c-a-t.

As early readers, children will be taught to use 'Synthetic Phonics'. This is a technical name and is nothing to do with being artificial, it refers to synthesising or blending sounds to make a word.

There are, as we know, 26 letters in the English alphabet but there are 44 phonemes in the spoken language. For example 'sh' 'ch and 'ay' are, phonemes comprising of two letters of the alphabet. Some phonemes like 'igh' and 'ear' are made of three letters. Each phoneme is known as a grapheme, when used in a written format. Your child will use and understand these words during their phonics teaching.



How Does Synthetic Phonics Teaching Begin?



Children begin their learning as soon as they can hear and identify audible sounds. This is the first step in phonics. It will begin when children are in the home or out and about, it will occur prior to school age but there it will be a focus as children begin in Nursery Class. Children need to have the ability to identify sounds and differences in sounds before they can learn the 44 phonemes.

What system do we use ?

At Civitas we follow Letters and Sounds. This is a phonics resource published by the Department for Education and Skills in 2007. It aims to build children's speaking and listening skills in their own right as well as to prepare children for learning to read by developing their phonic knowledge and skills.



How Can I help my child with their Phonics?

1. Talk! Talk! Talk! Build your child's vocabulary and their listening skills.
2. Read to and with your child, point out starting sounds, letters and punctuation.
3. Sing together and play with musical instruments— this builds children's ability to listen
4. Explore rhyme, point out words that rhyme when you're reading, make up silly rhymes together or change famous rhymes such as humpty dumpty.
5. Look out for alliteration— this is when words start with the same sound for example Peter picked a pickled pepper. Make up your own tongue twister.
6. Talk about the phonemes that words start with and play games such as I spy.

Tapestry Online Learning Journal



At Civitas we use an online learning journal system called 'Tapestry'. When your child starts at nursery we will create an account for you to activate. Once you have set a password and pin for your account you will be able to view your child's learning journal. We encourage you to upload your own observations of your child at home, as this creates a bigger picture of your child's development and supports our parent partnership links.

Online Learning Journey - Parents' Guide

All children attending Civitas have a personal on-line Learning Journey which records photos, observations and comments, in line with the Early Years Foundation Stage, to build up a record of your child's experiences during their time with us. We use Tapestry, a system, which is hosted in the UK on secure servers. You will have secure access (via email address and password) to your child's Learning Journey and, in addition to viewing our contributions, we encourage you to add to it by uploading photos and comments or commenting on observations made by us.
