What have we been learning this week?

Reception:

This week in Reception we read the text 'I love The Earth'. The author, Todd Parr, explores the important, timely subject of environmental protection and conservation. We looked at how the children can "go green" every day. The children learned the importance of turning off the tap while brushing their teeth to save water, to turn off their lights when they are not in their room, and other ways to help to look after the world. We watched videos about recycling and global warming, and about a girl called "Greta Thunberg", who wants to stop climate change. The children made posters about ways we can help to protect the earth. We also looked at different habitats and what we know about how these habitats are being damaged. In maths, we further explored odd and even. In our maths carousel, the children have been sorting numicons into odd and even groups. In our art area, the children made art using old magazines and recycling materials, such as egg boxes and toilet rolls. We cut out pictures from different objects like cans, different kinds of food and materials, to glue them in the correct recycling bins. The children have been writing about recycling and have amazed us by how they are able to write independently!



Key Stage 1

Year 1: This week, Year 1 have written and published their very own narratives based on the text 'Somebody Swallowed Stanley'. We worked hard to include exciting adjectives, remembering our capital letters and full stops. In Maths, we have applied our knowledge and skills to complete end of term assessments. In PSHE, we explored the changes from being a baby to being five or six years old. This includes physical changes and abilities – we drew a timeline of ourselves at different ages. In Science, we investigated chemical reactions and discussed the meanings of liquid, solid and gas. As part of our experiment, we tested how liquid and solid can create a chemical reaction turning it into a gas using vinegar, balloon, bicarbonate soda and an empty water bottle! For Computing this week, we have begun to explore the app called Scratch Junior as we apply our programming skills that we learnt in summer term 1. For DT, we created a survey to collect data about which vegetables and fruits are our favourite to eat.



Year 2: This week year 2 have started to plan their biography in English. They have learnt lots of amazing facts about Wangari. We are looking forward to publishing our final biography today. In Maths, the children have been recapping time. They have looked at quarter to and quarter and past. It would be good if the children could continue to practice this at home. In whole class reading the children continued to read Fantastic Mr Fox. The children enjoyed answering inference and retrieval styled questions. In Science this week the children have made suncatchers. We spoke about how the sun will make the colours shine through the window.

In History, we have continued to look at Reading. We have looked at the history of reading and what the 3 B's stand for.

Key Stage 2

Year 3: What fun! Year 3 are professional archeologists! We had a 'dig'. We entered the area marked off with 'danger' tape, we wore reflective tops and gloves. We used brushes to brush the dirt away once we found an object and it was then recorded. Some items we found were older than our parents... This tied in with our theme in Power and governance in Global learning where we have been exploring diverse types of information, such as primary information where archeologists help us understand the past. A very big thank you to Mr Scott who so kindly helped us set up this learning enquiry. In Math we have learnt about right angles by using our 'angle muncher', obtuse and acute angles and compared angles. We learnt about horizontal and vertical lines and practiced drawing lines properly. In English we revised features of a playscript and wrote out our first draft of our own playscript, made our corrections and then published the finished piece of writing. In Science we learnt about how magnetism has helped people around the world and Albert Einstein's thoughts on it. We used the force of magnetic attraction to make a compass in an experiment. We are preparing for our creation of a car in Design and Technology. Most children have brought in plastic lids that they are going to use for wheels and bottles for car bodies. If you have not brought any in, please bring them in on Monday. In Spanish we revised and consolidated the names of wild and domestic animals.



Year 4: We have had a very busy week in Year 4. In Maths, we have continued our topic of shape. We have explored polygons, quadrilaterals and lines of symmetry. Next week we will be moving onto a new topic of statistics. This week we have carried on our learning on the topic of the Windrush. This week marked the 75th Anniversary of the first time the HMT Empire Windrush Ship arrived at Tilbury Dock, bringing with it

over a thousand people from The Caribbean, who were ready to start their new lives in England. In English, we planned, wrote, edited, and published our own narratives, based on the book 'Coming to England' by Floella Benjamin. In History, we explored the life of Evelyn Wauchope another member of the Windrush Generation. During Art, we have been inspired by Vanley Burke to use the iPad to capture photographs of our school community and learnt techniques to edit these images. In Science, we have set up a very exciting experiment to test our scientific question of 'Does sugary and acidic drinks cause damage to teeth?'. We are looking forward to seeing the result next week. We ended our week with an extra afternoon play time to celebrate everyone in Year 4 being awarded 'star of the week' for all of our hard work last week in our multiplication check. Well Done Year 4!







Year 5: In year 5 this week we have been working hard on our English and Maths assessments. We have been using this opportunity to prepare further for SATS by taking our assessments in exam conditions – Year 5 coped amazingly well doing this in the heat. In Global Learning this week we have been exploring the life of a Victorian child criminal – Thomas Miller – who was sent to prison multiple times and whipped for petty crimes. We have been imagining what life would have been like for Thomas and created a speech pleading for change. In DT this week we have been creating models of our Victorian torture device and using this opportunity to edit our designs based on the complications we encountered in making our models. This week we were also lucky to have a visit from Michelin trained chef – Anthony Cumberbatch – who taught the year 5s to make sweetbread. It was a fantastic opportunity for us to get our hands dirty and try something new out of the classroom. The bread both smells and looks delicious!


